## TO REALLY PRAY, GET BY YOURSELF

(Considering the Transfiguration Trio: Moses, Elijah, Jesus) Mt 6:6-8; Ex 3:1, 19:3; I Kings 17:23; 19;8-12

- I. Enter into a Sacred Silence (N.B. Moses, Elijah & Jesus seeking solitude)
  - A. Eliminating, ignoring threats to well-being:
    - 1. Distractions—"we are distraction from distraction by distractions" (T.S. Eliot)—noise (ubiquitous and high decibels) harms hearing (both physical and spiritual)
    - 2. Diversions-media, sports, hobbies,
    - 3. Dissensions-familial, societal, political, congregational worries
    - 4. Hurry—Karl Jung: "Hurry is not of the devil. It is the devil."
  - B. Hearing "still small voice"—Elijah (I Kings 19:11-12)
  - C. Knowing that wise men urge withdrawing from society, learning to quiet one's heart—c.f. Toynbee's "with drawing for many solution without the formation of the solution of
    - "withdrawal and "response of "creative minorities" in A Study of History
    - 1. Secular perspectives
      - a. "The stillest tongue can be the truest friend" (Euripides).
      - b. "Speech is of time, silence is of eternity" (Thomas Carlyle)
      - c. "Silence is the element in which great things fashion themselves together, that at length they may emerge, full-formed and majestic, into the daylight of life, which they are henceforth to rule" (Maurice Maeterlinck).
      - d. The right word may be effective, but no word was ever effective as a rightly timed pause" (Mark Twain)
    - 2. Biblical precepts, examples
      - a. "Be still, and know that I am God" (Ps. 46:10).
      - b. Jesus "departed to a solitary place, and there prayed" (Mk 1:35)
- II. Secure a Sacred Space (N.B. Moses, Elijah, & Jesus finding special places)
  - A. Holy Land, Holy City—OT concern for land, sites
  - B. Deserts:
    - 1. John the Baptist's wilderness, Jesus' temptations
    - 2. St Anthony's desert solitude—Athanasius' Life of St Anthony
  - C. Mountains
    - 1. Moses at Mt Sinai
    - 2. Elijah at Mt Horeb—the mountain of the Lord
    - 3. "I will lift up my eyes unto the hills" (Ps 121:1)
    - 4. Katherine Lee Bates's "America the Beautiful"
  - E. Oceans-Rick Kennedy's Winds of Santa Ana
  - F. Jesus prescribes personal places, secluded from external factors—Mt 6:6-8; Blaise Pascal: challenge to be alone in a room by yourself (*Pensees*).
- III. Find a Sacred Time
  - A. Sabbath import: "Judaism is a religion of time, aiming at the sanctification of time" (Abraham Heschel).
  - B. Greek distinction clarifies how time can be sacred:
    - 1. Chronos describes ordinary, clocklike, monotonous, work times
    - 2. Kairos describes good times, ecstasy, worship time
  - C. "Where, except in the present, can the Eternal be met" (C.S. Lewis)
  - D. Assigned times helpful: morning & evening; seven scheduled times; liturgical routines (e.g. Easter, Pentecost); sources such as Book of Common Prayer with daily readings from Psalms
  - E. Continual attitude: minute-by-minute, hour-by-hour pray without ceasing, slipping through the "wrinkle in time" (Madeline. L'Engle)
- IV. Cultivate a Sacred Stance: humility-cf. Lk 18:9-14
  - A. Pharisee's phony pretense condemned
  - B. Tax-gatherer's contrition exemplary
  - C. King Canute's example
