## SLOUCHING GOWARDS GOWORRAM

1 Cor 5:1-13, 6:12-20

## I. AT ISSUE: SEXUAL IMMORALITY

- A. Corinthian issues:
  - 1. Incest—glaring blemish on congregation; both offender and those tolerating him rebuked
  - 2. In addition (6:9): fornicators, adulterers, homosexuals, sodomites
  - 3. In fine: Corinthians compromising with loose sexual standards of Greco-Roman world
- B. American situation: resembling Sodom & Gomorrah:—cf. Robert Bork's Slouching Toward Gomorrrah:

  Modern Liberalism and American Decline
  - 1. Rationalizations—cf. Michael Jones: *Degenerate Moderns: Modernity as Rationalized Sexual Misbehavior*—intellectual justifications seedbeds for depravity; "ideas have consequences"
    - a. Repudiating Victorian era's restrained sexual morality as prudish
    - b. Progressive/Socialistic thinkers, organizations—Margaret Sanger illustrative
    - c. Women's suffrage (rooted in French Revolution's "equality" & Marquis de Sade helps shape "Roaring Twenties" and significant sexual
    - d. Lambeth Conference & Anglicans endorse contraception, 1930; cf. Mary Eberstadt: *Adam and Eve After the Pill: Paradoxes of the Sexual Revolution*; Martin Luther considered it worse than incest or adultery; Calvin called it an "unforgivable crime;" Paul VI accurately predicted consequences in 1968
    - e. William Reich's *Sexual Revolution* supports unfettered sexual indulgence at any age for any reason—part of Frankfurt School's cultural Marxism flourishing the U.S. following WWII
    - f. "Kinsey Reports" influence academia, judiciary, press, despite demonstrable falsehoods; anti-Christian
    - g. Radical Feminist manifestoes and organizations—Simone de Beauvior's *Second Sex & Betty Frieden's The Feminine Mystique* dismiss motherhood & housework as beneath a woman's dignity; cf. Abigail Favale: *The Genesis of Gender: A Christian Theory*—"giving my students poison to drink".
    - h. Schools & mandatory "sex education" classes—c.f. William Kilpatrick's *Why Johnny Can't Tell Right from Wrong: Moral Illiteracy and the Case for Character Education;* Miriam Grossman's *Unprotected says* colleges give "a tacit approval of promiscuity and experimentation"
    - i. Joseph Fletcher's Situation Ethics & "new morality" greatly influential
      - a. "Situation ethics aims at contextual appropriateness—not the 'good' or the 'right' but the 'fitting.""
      - b. Agape singular absolute: "Only one 'thing' is intrinsically good; namely love: nothing else at all."
      - c. Ethical "principles or maxims or general rules are illuminators." But they are not directors."
      - d. Presuppositions: Pragmatism; Relativism; Positivism; Personalism
    - j. Churches impacted by "situation ethics".
      - a. Nazarene Mildred Bangs Wynkoop's *Theology of Love* shapes post-1972 thinkers/preachers— citing her influence, Thomas Jay Oord and some 90 Nazarenes contributed to *Why the Church of the Nazarene Should be fully LGBTQ+ Affirming*
      - b. Methodism's predicament analyzed by Karen Booth in: Forgetting How to Blush: United Methodism, Christians and Fractured American Politics.
        - 1. Leaders "promoted a value neutral approach to sexual ethics called 'the new morality."
        - 2. In 1972 "sex education" added to Book of Discipline
        - 3. Gay activists continually pressure denomination to be more affirming
        - 4. In 2024, United Methodism's governing General Conference deleted the "denominations specific disapproval of adultery, premarital/extramarital sex, and homosexual behavior from its Book of Discipline."
  - 2. Sobering sociological/statistical data demonstrating success of the Sexual Revolution of the 1960s
    - a. Pornography easily available, generally tolerated if not celebrated
    - b. Contraception generally approved & practiced throughout world
    - c Fornication widespread, generally approved—"living together"
    - d. Adultery pervasive, thought generally condemned
    - e. Sodomy normalized & supported-e.g. "gay pride" month
    - f. "Pedophilia chic" supported in certain circles (APA) though still condemned by most
    - g. Bestiality generally condemned, though Peter Singer and some support it if animals unharmed

## II. RIGHT RESPONSE: DISCIPLINE

- A. Confront: have courage to deal with offender
- B. Explain: reasonable rules, rooted in biblical texts as well as natural law
- C. Expel/Excommunicate: sever ties with evil-doers
